#### WELCOME to the 68th Season of the Salem Youth Symphony!

My older brother played trumpet, so I always appreciated the sound of his playing, except for the time he woke our family on Christmas morning playing "Reveille"! My first opportunity to play in a symphony orchestra was shortly after I moved to Oregon in August before my eighthgrade year. I sat in the back of the cello section of a youth orchestra, right in front of the trumpets, completely unaware of the life-changing moment I was about to experience. The trumpet section began to play the opening fanfare of the "Wedding March" in Mendelssohn's Midsummer Night's Dream. I had never felt the hairs on the back of my neck go up from live music that I was actively participating in. When I got home from rehearsal, I flew up the stairs and declared to my parents, "I am going to make music my career, somehow, someway." Ironically, Danny Hunt, director of our very own Philharmonia, was a member of that trumpet section back in 1987. I am a bit of a t-shirt pack rat and still have the one with the names of all the students in that orchestra and our names appear together there as they do in today's program.

That moment 35 years ago has always influenced my programming as I strive to select great music to feature our amazing brass section. Today is no exception. The look on the string players' faces, including my daughter's, was priceless as the trumpets began playing Summon the Heroes for the first time this fall, reminding me of that moment I experienced so many years ago. Adding one more layer to the story, the iconic solo in that selection will be played by Danny Hunt's son Nicholas while Mr. Hunt himself sits in the orchestra playing the sixth trumpet part. Two fathers making music with two of their children. Life has a funny way of coming full circle.

You never know when you are going to experience something that will change the course of your life. Salem Youth Symphony endeavors to provide our members and families with new musical connections that reach beyond school boundaries to enrich our community and promote lifelong learning. Who knows what new connections made in our rehearsal rooms in the fall of 2022 will influence the path of someone on stage today in 2057. Perhaps these new friendships will lead to new families, business partnerships, or concertgoers of the future who will sit side by side as SYS alumni watching the next generation pour their heart and soul into music, as you will witness today.

#### Morning Lights

Brian Balmages (b. 1975)

**TORNING LIGHTS** is an original composition by Brian Balmages. After waking from a deep and satisfying sleep, Balmages noticed the beauty of the summer morning sky. This piece was written to capture his experience. With open and bright tonalities, the soaring melodies and countermelodies produce an uplifting and joyful sound.

#### VIKING

SOON HEE NEWBOLD (B. 1974)

COME LEGENDS AND MYTHS depict the Vikings as ruthless savages from the north, invading and conquering lands wearing horned helmets. A more accurate picture portrays these ancient Scandinavians as explorers and pirates who did a fair amount of raiding but also traded and settled in many parts of Europe during the Viking Age (800 to 1050 AD). Their famous longships were fast and agile allowing them to enter smaller inlets and shallow water. The piece depicts strength and power by using long bow strokes and accented staccato notes.

#### March of the Meistersingers

RICHARD WAGNER (1813-1883) arr. Sandra Dackow

ARCH OF THE MEISTERSINGERS is an arrangement of music from Richard Wagner's opera Die Meistersinger. Wagner was a German composer who is mainly known for his operas such as The Valkyrie and Tristan and Isolde. The story of Die Meistersinger revolves around a group of amateur poets and musicians or Master Singers. This group had developed an intricate system of rules for composing and performing songs. This opera is the only comedy among Wagner's well-known works. Performing this work allows the students to develop playing in a classical style with marcato bow strokes, balanced dynamics, and crisp, march-like rhythms.



#### Angels in the Bleak Midwinter

LARRY CLARK (B. 1963)

**TN THIS GORGEOUS** holiday medley, you will L enjoy not only Gustav Holst's hauntingly lovely "In the Bleak Midwinter," but also the joyous carol "Angels We Have Heard on High." This piece has allowed students to develop a rich, smooth tone as well as their vibrato. We hope you are left with the feeling of warmth and joy.

#### Dragonfly

Doug Spata (B. 1975)

**TIKE A DRAGONFLY** flitting through the air, ■ sixteenth-note runs dart across shifting meters, passing between sections before landing firmly. The accompaniment buzzes with intensity as dark themes emerge from the lower voices and settle into a languid glide, only to fly again into a furious conclusion. Students will be counting and concentrating in this piece to accurately place short eighth notes within the flitting sixteenth notes. To play these fast passages, students have worked on playing with a short bow stroke like the flutter of a dragonfly's wings.

#### RADETZKY MARCH

Johann Strauss Sr. (b. 1804–1849) arr. Merle J. Isaac

THIS FAMOUS MARCH has been popular ever since it was first performed in Vienna in 1848. Strauss had been commissioned to write the music in honor of Field Marshal Joseph Radetzky von Radetz's victory at the battle of Custoza. The tone of this march is celebratory and festive rather than imposing and martial. When it was first played for Austrian soldiers, they spontaneously clapped along with the march sections, and audiences today continue this tradition.

#### PEER GYNT SUITE NO. 1, OP. 46

EDVARD GRIEG (1843–1907)

PEER GYNT SUITE is the most recognizable music by Norway's most famous composer, Edvard Grieg. Grieg wrote the music to accompany the play Peer Gynt by his fellow countryman Henrik Ibsen. The play, based on a Norwegian fairy tale, depicts the adventures of a charming rogue named Peer Gynt as he travels from the mountains of Norway to the North African desert to seek his fortune.

- Morning Mood—This movement describes the sun rising over the desert in North Africa.
- II. Ase's Death—While traveling, presumably in Africa, Peer hears a voice that tells him to go home where he finds his mother dying.
- III. Anitra's Dance—This music is from the scene in the play where Peer, back in North Africa, is visiting a Bedouin tribe. There he meets Anitra, his host's daughter, who performs a graceful dance.

IV. In the Hall of the Mountain King—The final movement takes place in a dream. Peer enters a large underground hall that is home to creatures such as trolls, goblins, and gnomes. Peer has insulted the creatures' king and begins to sneak away. The creatures follow and chase him. Peer escapes just in time and slams several doors on the way out.

#### SLEIGH RIDE

Leroy Anderson (1908–1975)

LEROY ANDERSON BEGAN composing Sleigh Ride in July 1946 during a heat wave. Although it was not originally written as a Christmas piece, it is now one of the most popular and most-performed songs at Christmas. In this musical depiction of a winter sleigh ride, you can hear the clip-clop of the horses' hooves, the crack of a whip, and the jingling of sleigh bells.

#### SUMMON THE HEROES

JOHN WILLIAM (B. 1932)

**CUMMON THE HEROES** was written by John Williams for the 1996 Summer Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia. It was premiered by the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra and conducted by Williams at the opening ceremony on July 19, 1996. Dedicated to Tim Morrison, trumpet soloist of the Boston Pops Orchestra, it is an awe-inspiring movement that captures the pageantry, emotion, and significance of this worldwide event. Its major sections are titled Fanfare, Prologue, Flags, Contest, and Parade.

#### Symphonie fantastique

HECTOR BERLIOZ (1803–1869)

ON SEPTEMBER 11, 1872, twenty-three-year-old Hector Berlioz attended a performance of Hamlet at the Odéon theater in Paris. He immediately fell in love with the Irish-born actress Harriet Smithson and embarked on a fevered campaign to win her over. Their wedding took place six long years later at the British Embassy in Paris. In the intervening years Berlioz wrote, revised, and twice debuted Symphonie fantastique, a musical memoir of his infatuation with Smithson—what Berlioz called "the supreme drama of my life"—and his most successful and enduring work.

Berlioz was born in 1803 in southeastern France. He discovered music at his village church and became an accomplished flutist and guitarist. His father was a doctor who prepared Berlioz for the same career, sending him off to medical school in Paris in 1821. Eventually, over his parents' strong objections (his mother begged him not to sully the family name), Berlioz began his study of composition in 1826. After seeing Smithson, who did not respond to any of his letters, Berlioz planned from a distance to convey his adoration with a grand gesture.

Symphonie fantastique premiered in Paris in 1830. Berlioz, an admirer of Beethoven's revolutionary work, had created a work freed from traditional structures and intent on telling an individual's story. Audiences received program notes to help them grasp the mood and meaning of the music.

Symphonie fantastique is presented in five movements: the first a dream, the second a ball where the musician sees his beloved, the third a country scene, the fourth a nightmare execution, and the fifth a horrifying conclusion.

#### Presented in today's concert:

I. Reveries and Passions—A young musician sees for the first time the woman of his dreams. Regarding the melody—the idée fixe—Berlioz wrote: "It seemed to me to express exactly the grief of a young heart in the first pangs of hopeless love, and I adopted it. It is the melody sung by the first violins at the beginning of the Largo in Part One." The first movement spans a gamut of emotions: melancholic reverie, delirious passions, fury, jealousy, tenderness, sadness, and consolation.

IV. March to the Scaffold—Certain that his love goes unrecognized, the musician poisons himself and plunges into horrible visions. He imagines he has killed the woman he loves and is led to the scaffold to witness his own execution. This movement was the first composed and, according to Berlioz, was written in a single night.

v. Dream of the Witches' Sabbath—The musician sees himself in the midst of ghosts, monsters, and sorcerers who have all come together for his funeral. The tolling bells and brass portray the famous medieval melody "Dies irae" (Day of Wrath). There are strange noises, groans, outbursts of laughter, and distant cries which other cries seem to answer. When his beloved arrives, the symphony comes to a frenzied conclusion.

Though Berlioz was exploring his own feelings and coping with acute emotional distress, Symphonie fantastique set a new mark for Romantic symphonies and the modern orchestra. After a prolific and influential career in composing, conducting, and music criticism, he died in 1869 and is buried in Montmartre Cemetery in Paris.

#### JON HARRIS-CLIPPINGER

Musical Director and Conductor of Salem Youth Symphony



JON HARRIS-CLIPPINGER has been with the Salem Youth Symphony organization for 24 years. He currently conducts the Youth Symphony Orchestra, the premier ensemble, and serves as musical director of the Salem Youth Symphony Association. He received his Bachelor of Music

Education from Willamette University where he studied conducting under Bruce McIntosh, Martin Behnke, and Wallace Long. He received his Master of Music Education from the University of Illinois where he studied conducting under Donald Schleicher, Deborah Sheldon, and Kathleen Horvath.

Jon has taught orchestra in Salem-Keizer for 24 years and currently works in the South Salem High School orchestra program at Leslie Middle School and Howard Street Charter School. He has fostered collaborations between the Newport Youth Symphony at the Oregon Coast (NYSOC), Central Oregon Youth Symphony (COYS), and Salem Youth Symphony. Members of the organizations have inspired elementary students by producing children's concerts at the Performing Arts Center in Newport and in the Bend-La Pine school district. Jon developed the masterclass series connecting SYS musicians with world-renowned teachers and artists from Juilliard, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, and beyond.

Jon is the executive director of Summer Strings, an orchestra camp he founded in 1999 that serves 200 area string students. In 2003, Jon was a guest conductor with the South Salem High School Chamber Orchestra at the prestigious Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic. He remains an active member of the National Association for Music Education (NAfME), the Oregon Music Education Association (OMEA), and the American

String Teachers Association (ASTA). Jon has been a guest conductor, adjudicator, and clinician for the Washington State University Orchestra Festival. He has adjudicated events for the Evergreen School District Solo and Ensemble Festival, MTNA String Solo Competition, and the Oregon Cello Society.

Jon has privately taught several award-winning cellists. He received his inspiration for working with youth orchestras as a member of the Portland Youth Philharmonic (PYP) from 1987–1994 where he toured Europe and Asia under the direction of Jacob Avshalomov. Jon enjoys living in Salem with his wife, Jennifer, and their daughter, Emma, who plays in Youth Symphony. His son, Caden, Salem Youth Symphony alum and past concerto winner, is off on his next adventure and has begun studying cello performance at the University of Oregon with Steve Pologe, \$YS\$ cello coach.

and violin performance. He taught in Illinois for four years while completing a master's degree in music education at Illinois State University. 




