

CALEM YOUTH SYMPHONY'S TRADITION of an annual concerto competition began in 1956. The competition was newly named in 2018 to honor Larry Garrett's 20 seasons as conductor of the Youth Symphony.

The annual Larry Garrett Concerto Competition is open to musicians participating in the Youth Symphony. Musicians perform with their accompanist in front of an audience and five adjudicators. The winner receives a cash prize of \$500 and performs with the Youth Symphony at one of the two season concerts.

TICHOLAS PETERSON-HUNT, a senior at West Salem High School, started playing the trumpet in the fifth grade. His dad, Danny Hunt, was his first trumpet teacher. After three years he began studying with Jaimie Hall, who was also his middle school band director. In 2020, as an eighth grader, Nicholas entered the National Trumpet Competition (NTC) and was invited to perform in the live round in Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania. Unfortunately, this competition was canceled due to Covid-19.

Nicholas has been a member of the West Salem High School Wind Ensemble for four years and the Salem Youth Symphony for six years. He is in his fifth year of studying trumpet with Jaimie Hall. Nicholas was selected to play in the following high school honor groups: All-Northwest Honor Symphony, All-State Honor Band, All-State Symphony Orchestra as principal trumpet, and Salem All-City Honor Band. He placed first in the state solo contest on trumpet in 2022 and 2023. His school's large trumpet ensemble also placed first in state in 2022 and 2023 and the small trumpet ensemble placed second in state in 2022 and first in state in 2023. This past year he entered the National Trumpet Competition and was invited to play in the live round for the high school solo and ensemble divisions in Boulder, Colorado. The Salem Trumpet Ensemble ended up placing second in the nation! Nicholas just found out he will be going to NTC in Kingsville, Texas to compete in both the solo and ensemble divisions again this year.

Nicholas plans to pursue a degree in trumpet performance at University of Colorado Boulder, University of Southern California, Rice University or University of Oregon in the fall. He hopes to one day become a professional symphonic trumpet player. Nicholas also enjoys backpacking, weight training, walking his dogs Benny and Murphy and hanging out with his friends.

SOON HEE NEWBOLD (B. 1974)

IN ANCIENT TIMES, many people lived in small tribes and traveled in caravans. They journeyed across vast

primitive lands hunting and gathering goods to survive. Natural landmarks and stars in the night sky guided their way. These people lived simply, traveling with their few possessions, and settling for small periods of time in different locations. Most modern-day cultures can trace their roots back to a nomadic history.

Small Overture

BOB MATHEWS (B. 1954)

AN OVERTURE IN MUSIC is an instrumental composition typically played at the beginning of an opera, ballet, or play, serving as an introduction and setting the tone for the performance. This lively overture features an energetic melody with a delightful folksy charm. The opening captures the essence of a modal fiddle tune, while the inner section unfolds with a seamless and legato character, providing a dynamic contrast within the composition.

OCEAN STORM "LA TEMPESTA DI MARE"

Antonio Vivaldi (1678–1741), arr. Tom Fritz

EXPERIENCE THE captivating force of Antonio Vivaldi's "La Tempesta di Mare" (The Storm at Sea) in this dramatic arrangement for strings by Tom Fritz. Ascending and descending passages, coupled with dynamic call and response, vividly depict the swells of the storm, offering a powerful and immersive musical journey into the heart of Vivaldi's tempestuous masterpiece.

"March of Homage," From Sigurd Jorsalfar

EDVARD GRIEG (1843–1907), ARR. MERLE J. ISAAC

Composed by Grieg for a play of the same name.

The "Homage March" is one of the movements within this suite. The work depicts the story of Sigurd the Crusader, or Sigurd Jorsalfar in Norwegian, and this march is a ceremonial and regal piece that captures the atmosphere of medieval times. The piece includes fanfare-like brass sections, rhythmic percussion, and lush string passages. It's a powerful and dignified musical piece that captures the essence of ceremonial events.

Rosamunde Overture

Franz Schubert (1797–1828) Arr. Vernon Leidig

TIKE SO MANY other Schubert gems, the incidental music to the play *Rosamunde* lay dusty and neglected for many years and was discovered only accidentally. In 1867, George Grove, suspecting that a mine of Schubert gold lay hidden and forgotten, decided to search Vienna. He looked over heaps of unprinted music scores, letters, and other longneglected material. Grove pulled out something that looked promising and played it on the piano. The pile of loot grew higher with every hour. By midnight he had recovered all the lost part-books of *Rosamunde*.

Schubert composed this *Rosamunde* music for a stage production which took place in Vienna in 1823. The play was a failure and ran for only two nights. After that presentation, the music was completely forgotten until it was restored to the music world almost 50 years later. The most famous piece in the music is the overture.

Philharmonia Orchestra

1812 Overture

PYOTR ILYICH TCHAIKOVSKY (1840–1893) arr. Jerry Brubaker

THIS PIECE BY Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky, composed in 1880, commemorates Russia's victory over Napoleon's forces in 1812. Premiered in 1882 in Moscow, it was commissioned for the consecration of the Cathedral of Christ the Savior. The overture, scored for a large orchestra with cannons and bells, incorporates Russian folk tunes and military themes, creating a patriotic and celebratory atmosphere. The use of actual cannons during performances adds a dramatic touch. Widely popular, especially in Independence Day celebrations, the 1812 Overture is known for its thrilling orchestration that evokes national pride.

Wiener Philharmoniker Fanfare

RICHARD STRAUSS (1864–1949)

THIS SHORT YET STIRRING fanfare scored for large brass ensemble and timpani was composed by Richard Strauss in 1924 for the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra. It was commissioned for a benefit ball to raise money for the orchestra's pension fund. The fanfare was recently performed at the coronation of Charles III and Camilla in May 2023.

Légende

GEORGES ENESCU (1881–1955), ORCH. RICHARD DUBUGNON

TEORGES ENESCU'S LÉGENDE for trumpet and piano, composed in 1906, stands as a testament to the composer's mastery of expressive lyricism and inventive musical language. Enescu, a Romanian composer of diverse talents, wrote this piece during a period marked by rich creativity and exploration of different styles.

Orchestrated by Swiss-born composer and double bass player Richard Dubugnon (b. 1968), the Légende unfolds with a captivating dialogue between the trumpet and orchestra, in which the solo trumpet weaves a lyrical narrative over a foundation of evocative harmonies. Enescu's distinctive voice is evident in the seamless blend of Romanian folk influences with French Impressionistic elements, creating a work that is both emotionally resonant and technically demanding.

The piece takes the listener on a journey through various moods, from introspective and melancholic to moments of triumphant brilliance. The trumpet's soaring lines and expressive phrasing, accompanied by the orchestra's lush textures, contribute to the overall narrative, allowing the performers to explore a wide palette of colors and emotions.

Légende showcases Enescu's ability to transcend cultural boundaries, incorporating elements from his Romanian heritage while embracing the broader European musical landscape. The piece is often performed in the trumpet repertoire, and it's admired for its lyrical qualities and the technical demands it places on the performer.

The Sorcerer's Apprentice

PAUL DUKAS (1865-1935)

PAUL DUKAS WAS A FRENCH composer and music critic, best known for a small but highly regarded body of work. *The Sorcerer's Apprentice* is his most famous composition. Dukas composed this symphonic poem in 1897–1898, inspired by Johann Wolfgang von Goethe's ballad of the same name.

The Sorcerer's Apprentice tells the story of a young apprentice who, in the absence of his master, attempts to use magic to make his



chores easier but quickly loses control of the enchanted broomstick, leading to chaotic and humorous consequences.

The piece gained widespread popularity due to its inclusion in Walt Disney's animated film Fantasia (1940), in which a segment depicts Mickey Mouse as the apprentice. Dukas's work showcases his skill in orchestration, creating vivid musical imagery that captures the whimsical and fantastical elements of the narrative.

Capriccio italien

PYOTR ILYICH TCHAIKOVSKY (1840-1893)

TCHAIKOVSKY'S Capriccio italien is a vibrant and lively orchestral work that captures the essence of Italian folk music and dance. Composed in 1880, the piece is a colorful musical journey that transports listeners to the lively streets of Italy.

The capriccio, or caprice, is a free-spirited musical form that allows the composer to explore various themes and moods. In this work, Tchaikovsky takes inspiration from Italian folk tunes, infusing the composition with a joyful and exuberant character. The piece is known for its energetic rhythms, playful melodies, and orchestral brilliance.

Tchaikovsky's keen sense of orchestral color is evident throughout, with the music ranging from lively dance episodes to lyrical interludes.

Capriccio italien opens with a bold fanfare, setting the stage for the lively Italian dance that follows. The middle section introduces a more lyrical and introspective theme, providing a contrast to the exuberant opening. The work concludes with a spirited and triumphant finale, leaving the audience with a sense of joy and celebration.

Tchaikovsky's Capriccio italien is a delightful showcase of his melodic prowess, orchestral skill, and ability to evoke the spirit of different cultures. Its infectious energy and charm make it a perennial favorite in the orchestral repertoire, ensuring its enduring appeal to audiences around the world.

JON HARRIS-CLIPPINGER

Musical Director and Conductor OF SALEM YOUTH SYMPHONY



JON HARRIS-CLIPPINGER has been with the Salem Youth Symphony organization for 25 years. He currently conducts the Youth Symphony Orchestra, the premier ensemble, and serves as musical director of the Salem Youth Symphony Association. He received his Bachelor of Music

Education from Willamette University where he studied conducting under Bruce McIntosh, Martin Behnke, and Wallace Long. He received his Master of Music Education from the University of Illinois where he studied conducting under Donald Schleicher, Deborah Sheldon, and Kathleen Horvath.

Jon has taught orchestra in Salem-Keizer for 25 years and currently works in the South Salem High School orchestra program at Leslie Middle School and Howard Street Charter School. He has fostered collaborations between the Newport Youth Symphony at the Oregon Coast (NYSOC), Central Oregon Youth Symphony (COYS), and Salem Youth Symphony. Members of the organizations have inspired elementary students by producing children's concerts at the Performing Arts Center in Newport and in the Bend-La Pine school district. Jon developed the masterclass series connecting sys musicians with world-renowned teachers and artists from Juilliard, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, and beyond.

Jon is the executive director of Summer Strings, an orchestra camp he founded in 1999 that serves 200 area string students. In 2003, Jon was a guest conductor with the South Salem High School Chamber Orchestra at the prestigious Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic. He remains an active member of the National Association for Music Education (NAfME), the Oregon Music Education Association (OMEA), and the American String Teachers Association (ASTA). Jon has been a guest conductor, adjudicator, and clinician for the Washington

State University Orchestra Festival. He has adjudicated events for the Evergreen School District Solo and Ensemble Festival, MTNA String Solo Competition, and the Oregon Cello Society.

Jon has privately taught several award-winning cellists. He received his inspiration for working with youth orchestras as a member of the Portland Youth Philharmonic (PYP) from 1987–1994 where he toured Europe and Asia under the direction of Jacob Avshalomov. Jon enjoys living in Salem with his wife, Jennifer, and their daughter, Emma, who plays in Youth Symphony. His son, Caden, Salem Youth Symphony alum and past concerto winner, is off on his next adventure and has begun studying cello performance at the University of Oregon with Steve Pologe, sys cello coach.

JIM CHARNHOLM, a native of Salem, Oregon, and graduate of Sprague High School, knew from an early age that music would play a large part in his life. He graduated from the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York, with a bachelor's degree in education

and violin performance. He taught in Illinois for four years while completing a master's degree in music education at Illinois State University. Jim moved back to Oregon in 2002; he is proud to have been a part of further developing the tradition of musical excellence at McKay High School. During his seventeen-year tenure at McKay High School, the orchestra program grew. A full symphony was added in 2016. The McKay Chamber Orchestra consistently placed in the top ten at the OSAA String Orchestra Festival.

In 2019 the Oregon Symphony Association in Salem honored him with its award for Outstanding Music Educator of the Year. He serves on the board of the Oregon Coast Youth Symphony Festival based in Newport, Oregon, that provides a four-day festival for public school orchestra programs free of charge. Jim runs a family business with his wife, Anne Marie. They have two daughters, Amy and Megan. Jim enjoys hiking, sailing, and spending time with his family during his free time.

MAC MAYER CONDUCTOR OF AMADEUS PLAYERS



MAC MAYER is the orchestra director at Whiteaker Middle School and its feeder elementary schools in Keizer, Oregon. He holds undergraduate degrees in music performance and music education from The Ohio State University and a master's degree in music education

from the University of Kansas. Prior to teaching in the Salem-Keizer school district Mr. Mayer taught orchestra in Kansas, Georgia and Ohio.

Mac serves as co-chair for the Oregon Middle School All-State Orchestra and is a certified orchestra adjudicator in Oregon. In addition to conducting the Amadeus Players orchestra, Mr. Mayer works frequently as an adjudicator, clinician, and guest conductor.







WELCOME



THIRTEEN YEARS AGO, my musical world changed when my 5-year-old daughter, while accompanying me on Take Your Child To Work Day, asked, "Daddy, do they make violins that would fit me?" I found an old 1/8th size violin that had been donated to our instrument library and got it out for her to try. As I began showing her how to stand properly, she said, "I know how this works. Let me show you." Boy, was I in trouble in the most amazing way! She then proceeded to go through all of the beginning steps, including all of the quirky sayings I use in class to help students remember what to do next. She had been sitting in the back of my beginning orchestra class, as a kindergartener, observing the 4th graders instead of attending before-school Y Care. She had been watching, always watching, and thus reminded me of the impact we teachers can have on students, even when we don't know they are paying attention.

Every student on stage today has had their own pivotal moment—the moment when they discovered their desire to pursue music. Maybe it was a family member who passed down a family heirloom. Maybe it was watching any of the incredible music programs in our schools. Perhaps it was listening to a piece of movie music like The Sorcerer's Apprentice from Fantasia. And who knows, maybe someone in the audience today will exclaim at dinner this evening, "I am going to play the trumpet!" after listening to Nicholas Peterson-Hunt, our concerto winner. As some of you may recall from our Fall 2022 program, Nicholas's father, Danny, who directs Philharmonia, was playing in the trumpet section of Portland Youth Philharmonic in 1987 when I had my own "moment"—the moment I knew I wanted to become an orchestra director.

Today, I reach the end of my musical journey with my own children in SYS, as my daughter will soon head off to college and her next adventure. This journey has included hours of meaningful musical and personal moments with my kids and their friends. This journey has included looking out of one eye at my son performing Brahms's Double Concerto by my side, while simultaneously looking with the other at my daughter leading the second violins. Two years ago, this journey provided my father, who recently passed, with the opportunity to watch his son and two of his grandchildren perform Beethoven's 5th Symphony, his favorite musical composition. During his last days with us, he sometimes spontaneously sang out the opening motif, recalling that concert and providing his own exclamation point on his incredible life.

I want to thank my wife for her never-ending support for the past 25 years as I have walked out the door every Monday (and sometimes Thursday) evening to bring students, including our own children, together in the pursuit of great musical experiences. Without her love and support, none of these moments would have been possible for any of those families. I encourage all of you, regardless of your age, to be open to the next impactful moment in your lives. You never know what will come next.
